A Red Hat and the Goan Catholic Diaspora on their Knees

The August 27, 2022 consistory of the College of Cardinals summoned by Pope Francis, awakened the Goan Catholic Diaspora from around the world and compelled them to recall with gratitude the roots of their faith, and thus their responsibility to be the bearers of that faith on the world stage.

While the Archbishop of Goa and Daman, Filipe Nery Ferrao was installed as cardinal, a chosen close collaborator of the Pope to labor in the global vineyard, the Goan Catholic Diaspora from different continents, descended on the Vatican to embrace, accompany and support the newer and greater responsibilities entrusted to His Eminence Cardinal Ferrao. The newly installed 20 Cardinals was a renewed, gentle but poignant, reminder that the People of God are vibrantly living their faith at all intersections of the world, which challenges our historical imagination of a Westernized Church. Pope Francis reminded the Cardinals that Jesus " *(he) wants to share with us His magnanimity, His boundless and unconditional love, for His heart is afire with the mercy of the Father.*"

On August 28th, the Goan Catholic Diaspora, in droves, joined His Eminence Cardinal Ferrao at the Church of the Pontificio Collegio Urbano, in the vicinity of the Vatican, to celebrate the epoch of grace that our loving God has opened for us with Cardinal Ferrao as our "hinge" grounded in prudence, justice, fortitude and temperance. The Eucharistic Liturgy was presided by His Eminence Cardinal Ferrao, and joined by another newly installed His Eminence Cardinal Poola, Archbishop of Hyderabad, Cardinal Oswaldo Gracias, Mumbai, Cardinal Baselios Cleemis, Syro-Malankara Catholic Church, Cardinal George Alencherry, Syro Malabar Church, Archbishop Blasco Colaco, from Margao, Goa, who served his lifetime in the Diplomatic Service of the Holy See, and a two-dozen priests who have travelled from Goa with a joyful congregation of about 300. This solemn Eucharistic celebration was followed by an enthusiastic social gathering in the spacious dining room of the College, accompanied by delicious Goan gastronomy.

Cardinal Ferrao, overwhelmed by the outpouring of love and affection, remained gracious in acknowledging the generosity of the Goan Diaspora.

A "call" to be a cardinal by the Pope, is not a private call, but a public one. It is a call for an "*episkopo*i" (leader) of a particular community of the People of God – in our case of the people of God of the Archdiocese of Goa and Daman – to sail the Ship of Peter in the Universal Waters.



Your Window to Look Back into GOA



A case study of my proposal

The owners of many Goans houses express with pride the glamour, aristocracy, and upgraded status which came along with the Goan houses. However many houses have been unfortunate and have an ugly, bitter and sad story to tell, with their very existence.

Most house owners would cry fowl saying the maintenance cost of these houses is beyond their reach. But the fact remains that it is due to lack of family unity that leads to this unfortunate situation for some Goan houses.

The heirs of these families scattered all over the globe make it difficult to coordinate and reach a consensus on the future of these houses. However, I see a light at the end of this tunnel after deliberating with various legal experts. I suggest that one of the ways forward is to form a family trust.

Let us assume that there is a heritage house admeasuring "300 sqm (3200 sq feet)" on a plot of land admeasuring "2000 sqm (21,500 sq feet)" and the heirs of the family are two daughters and two sons, namely; Martha, Maria, Matthew & Mark. (names are fictitious). I have deliberately mentioned daughters in this example, as many times it is misinterpreted that a daughter once she is married has no right on the inherited property. These four children are principal trustees in the family trust and the conditions laid down in the bylaws of the trust are not only binding on the children but also the future heirs of these children.

The first step to be taken is to carry out the valuation of the land and the house through an approved

valuer. Upon doing the valuation of the land and the house, let's assume that we have arrived at the market value of Rs.1 crore.

In this situation, the four children have a 25% undivided share in the land and the house. Among the four children, Mathew is financially better off and he is willing to spend Rs.1 crore to carry out the repairs and improvements of the house to convert it into a homestay/ guesthouse with the consent of the other three siblings.

On completion of the repairs and improvement of the house with the expenditure of Rs.1 crore the market value of the land and the house



now increases to Rs. 5 crores. Now, the percentage entitlement of the shares of all 4 siblings changes with Matthew having a 40% undivided share and the other three having a 20% undivided share each in the land and ancestor's house.

The four children now decide to lease out the land and the house to an agency to operate the homestay/guesthouse. However, the first right of refusal is given to these four children to operate the homestay/guesthouse if they are capable and willing to do so.



The proceeds received from the lease are deposited into a trust fund and for the first two years, the amount in the trust fund is not withdrawn. From the third year onwards the proceeds received from the lease rent are again put in the trust fund and 50% is again kept in the fund for the maintenance of the land and the house and the balance 50% is distributed among the four children as per the share entitlement mentioned above.

Homestay/guesthouse is just one example. These houses could be put to other adaptive uses as well. This case study is a win-win situation for all four children and most importantly this heritage ancestral house is restored for posterity.

As a gesture of respect to eminent family members who excelled in their professional and social life, the later generations of these families went beyond installing life-size portraits and instead installed life-size busts of these family members, as a gesture of respect to this family member.

After the family moved to the village of Chinchinim, he donated the family heritage house in the village of Orlim admeasuring approximately "650 sqm (7000 sq feet)" along with a plot of land admeasuring approximately "8000 sqm (80,000 sq feet)" to the Presentation sisters who set up a convent and a school on this property. Many Goans from the village of Orlim and neighboring villages have benefited. A gesture such as this needs to be applauded and celebrated.





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


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
